48th Annual Academy of American and International Law

May 15 - June 24, 2011

The Center for American and International Law will hold the 48th session of the Academy of American and International Law from May 15 through June 24, 2011.

The Academy gives lawyers and judges from outside the United States an opportunity to study American law and international business transactions. The six-week program is business oriented and addresses a wide range of law-related commercial topics.

Lecturers are drawn both from the academic community and from private law practice. Participants attend lectures, take part in classroom exercises and work through a mock legal problem.

In 2010, the Academy hosted 65 participants from 25 nations. The 47 annual Academies have attracted participants from 121 countries, including attorneys, judges, law professors and government officials.

We are pleased to announce that those who attend the Academy and pass a subsequent examination may receive 3 hours of credit toward a Masters of Law degree at Southern Methodist University's Dedman School of Law. To receive credit, a student must also be admitted into the SMU Masters of Law program.

WHO SHOULD ATTEND?

This program is for lawyers and judges from countries other than the United States who are interested in American law and international business transactions. **It is particularly valuable for non-U.S. lawyers who work for multi-national corporations or for law firms that represent either U.S. clients or multi-national clients with U.S. interests.**

It is not intended for the highly experienced international lawyer. The Academy has attracted many lawyers who have gone on to prominent positions in their home countries. It provides a forum for those who are among the “best and brightest,” giving them an opportunity to gain practical knowledge and experience about American and international law.

GENERAL INFORMATION



THE DALLAS EXPERIENCE

Our goal is to introduce Academy participants not only to the study of American and International Law, but also to the people and culture of the United States. Education, of course, takes place both inside and outside the classroom. The Academy schedule includes such extra-curricular events as a rodeo, a major league baseball game, a Texas barbeque, and a visit to a Dallas law firm.

QUALIFICATIONS

Applicants should have a college degree and experience in one of the following fields: law, economics, journalism, teaching, or business. They must reside or have domicile outside the United States. Applicants must have substantial ability to read, speak and understand the English language. Instruction is in English.

TUITION AND LIVING EXPENSES

Participation in the 6-week course is available for a total cost of \$2,200 (\$1,000 annual dues and \$1,200 tuition) for members of the Southwestern Institute for International and Comparative Law. Members who pay annual dues of \$2,500 or more may send at least one person to the Academy at no tuition cost. Those who wish to attend the Academy, or to send someone to the Academy, may join the Institute and may take immediate advantage of the member benefit. Tuition for non-members is \$8,000. A deposit of \$1,000 is due by May 6, 2011.

Academy participants are housed together in one facility where we have negotiated a rate that includes lodging and transportation to and from class. Single, double and triple-occupancy suites are available at different prices.

AMONG THE FACULTY

EILEEN F. BABBITT (Negotiations/Mediation) is a Professor of International Conflict Management Practice and Director of the International Negotiation and Conflict Resolution Program at the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy in Medford, Massachusetts. She is also a Faculty Associate of the Program on Negotiation at the Harvard Law School.

JACK J. COE, JR. (International Commercial Arbitration) is a professor at Pepperdine University School of Law in Malibu, California. He is a specialist in private international law and has chaired the Academic Council of the Institute for Transnational Arbitration. He is an arbitrator listed on the panel of the International Centre for Dispute Resolution (AAA) and has been a chair of the Disputes Division of the ABA International Law Section.

CHARLES B. DOLEAC (Professional Responsibility and Legal Ethics) is a practicing lawyer in Portsmouth, New Hampshire. He has developed programs on ethics for lawyers and is certified by the Josephson Institute.

BRYAN GARNER (Legal Writing and Drafting) heads LawProse, Inc., in Dallas, Texas. He is Editor in Chief of *Black's Law Dictionary*. He has restyled federal rules for the U.S. Judicial Conference's Standing Committee on Rules of Practice and Procedure. He recently published *Making Your Case: The Art of Persuading Judges*, a book he co-authored with United States Supreme Court Justice Antonin Scalia. Mr. Garner also teaches at SMU Dedman School of Law, Dallas, Texas.

CHARLES H. GUSTAFSON (International Tax Law) is Professor of Law and Associate Dean for International and Graduate Programs at the Georgetown University Law Center in Washington, DC. He teaches in various areas of public international law, international trade and investment and federal taxation. He is a co-author of several casebooks on federal income taxation, including *Taxation of International Transactions* (West, 1997).

SUSAN KARAMANIAN (The U. S. Justice System; Common Law vs. Civil Law) is Associate Dean for International and Comparative Legal Studies and Professorial Lecturer in Law at the George Washington University Law School in Washington, D.C.

TOM SAYBOLT (International Business Transactions) is a professor at the University of Detroit Mercy School of Law in Detroit, Michigan where he teaches Business Organizations, International Business Transactions, International Trade & NAFTA. Professor Saybolt began his legal career with Ford Motor Company, served as Vice President, General Counsel and Secretary of Ford in Europe, and retired in 2004 as Associate General Counsel - Global Business Operations.

EDWARD T. SWAINE (Contract Law) is an Associate Professor of Law and Director of the Competition Law Center at the George Washington University Law School in Washington, D.C. Before joining the GW faculty in 2006, Professor Swaine was an associate professor of legal studies and business ethics at the Wharton School.

STEPHEN ZAMORA (International Litigation in U.S. Courts) is a professor and former Dean of the University of Houston Law Center, Houston, Texas and is a member of the Board of Editors of the *American Journal of Comparative Law*.
