William Tafoya, Ph.D.

William Tafoya is Professor of Criminal Justice in the Henry C. Lee College of Criminal Justice and Forensic Sciences. Dr. Tafoya holds a Ph.D. in Criminology from the University of Maryland - College Park. He is also a retired special agent of the FBI, teaching national security and forensic computer investigation courses. Dr. Tafoya received considerable international media coverage for the uncanny accuracy of his 1994 profile of Theodore Kaczynski (the Unabomber).

Joseph A. Shafer, Ph.D.

Joseph A. Shafer is Associate Professor and Undergraduate Program Director in the Center for the Study of Crime, Delinquency & Corrections at Southern Illinois University Carbondale. He was the 2006/07 President of PFI, serves on the Leadership Summit Consortium Advisory Board, and was a visiting scholar in the Behavioral Science Unit of the FBI Academy (2006/07).



Gary W. Sykes, Ph.D.

Gary W. Sykes, who earned a Ph.D. in political science from Pennsylvania State University, was a professor in the College of Urban and Public Affairs at the University of Louisville; Vice President of the Center for American and International Law and Director of the ILEA from 1989-2003. Most recently he served as a visiting professor of criminal justice at Mercyhurst College in Erie, Pennsylvania.
