THE FUTURE OF POLICING AND HOMELAND SECURITY

MARCH 26-28, 2003

This two-and-a-half-day conference will focus on the rapid changes taking place in American society. Terrorism and the emphasis on homeland security have brought, and are continuing to bring, profound changes to policing at local, state and federal levels of American society. At the same time, new technologies are transforming law enforcement and will be changing the way police services are delivered. This conference is designed to bring together futurists, police managers and executives from the law enforcement community to discuss future directions and trends during these changing times. Members of Police Futurists International, Inc. (PFI), an organization spawned by the futures courses at the FBI National Academy and members of the FBI-PFI Futures Working Group (FWG) are coming together to engage in a dialogue about these concerns.

Keynote Speaker

Joseph E. Brann, founder and president of Joseph Brann & Associates. From 1994 to 1999, he served as the first Director of the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) in the U.S. Department of Justice. Prior to his COPS appointment he served as chief of police in Hayward, California after starting his career in the Santa Ana Police Department. He will present on the topic: "The Future of Community Policing and Homeland Security."

Sandy Boyd, professor of justice administration at College of Marin in Kentfield, California. She has been a reserve police officer and dean of instruction at College of Marin. She holds a Ed.D. from the University of San Francisco. She will present on the topic: "Homeland Security and Social Change."

Michael Buerger, associate professor and graduate coordinator of the Criminal Justice Program at Bowling Green State University in Ohio. Former police officer in New Hampshire, he received a doctorate in criminal justice from Rutgers in 1993. He will present on the topic: "Monkey Wrenches, Evil Twins and Unintended Consequences."

Thomas J. Cowper, captain, New York State Police. Currently associate director for the Statewide Wireless Network under New York State's Office of Technology. He holds a master's degree from Marist College and is treasurer of Police Futurists International. He will present on the topic: "Emerging Technology and the Future."

Carl J. Jensen, III, supervisory special agent, Federal Bureau of Investigation, FBI Academy in Quantico, Virginia. He is chair of the FBI-PFI Futures Working Group and teaches the futures course at the FBI National Academy. He will present on the topic: "Futures Research and Law Enforcement."

Bernard H. Levin, professor of Psychology and Administration of Justice, Blue Ridge Community College, Weyers Cave, Virginia and commander, Policy and Planning Bureau, Waynesboro Police Department, Waynesboro, Virginia. He holds a Ed.D. and is an officer in the FBI-PFI Futures Working Group. He will present on the topic: "Homeland Security and Social Change."

John W. McNall, president, BOWMAC Software Inc. A graduate of the University of Dayton with a 33-year career in law enforcement management, training and consulting. He specializes in planning and project management with innovative software for emergency response management.

Alberto Melis, chief, Waco Police Department, Waco, Texas. Former police chief of Lauderhill, Florida Police Department and current member of the FBI-PFI Futures Working Group. He will present on the topic: "Presidential Security in the 9/11 Era."

Andreas (Olli) M. Olligschlaeger, president of TruNorth Data Systems. Formerly a systems scientist at Carnegie Mellon University where he received a Ph.D. in Public Policy. He will present on the topic: "Information Technology and Homeland Security: A Challenge to Law Enforcement."

From DFW Airport: Take the North Airport exit. Take 121 North and go approximately 18.5 miles to Legacy Drive. Turn right on Legacy Drive and go 1.5 miles to Parkwood Blvd. Turn right on Parkwood Blvd. and go .4 mile to Tennyson Parkway. Turn left on Tennyson Parkway and go .5 mile to Democracy Drive. We are on the right, on the corner of Democracy Drive and Tennyson Parkway.

From Downtown Dallas: Go north on the Dallas North Tollway. Take the Spring Creek Parkway/Dallas North Tollway frontage road.
